LET'S GO FISHING!!!

Ahhh...Summer has finally arrived in Southern Ontario. The kids are out of school. That means it's time to hang the "Gone Fishing" sign. It's Fishing Week all across Ontario from July 1st thru July 9th. The Ontario government designates this period to al-

low Canadian residences 18 to 64 years of age to LE-GALLY fish without a fishing licence. All other rules such as limits still apply however. In Ontario, children below the age of 18 can fish without a licence and take home a full limit of fish if they wish.

Fishing doesn't have to be expensive, a trip to Canadian Tire can get you a cheap starter combo for the kids a fishing rod, reel, line and lures for around \$30 to \$50. Don't forget the live bait!!

Why go fishing? Well.... there are many reasons to go fishing and its fun too!! Being active outside connecting with nature helps you feel better both mentally and physically. You can forget the pressures of daily life. It's all about the challenge of outwitting an elusive perch, trout, pike or bass. You will learn lots patience as well as mastering the art of attracting fish into striking your bait or lure. Fishing can also help you burn unwanted calories while walking or hiking to your fishing spot.

Depending on the weather or the time of day fish move around the lakes and streams in groups called schools in search of food. Ask your fishing buddies, contact the local Conservation Authority or even drop into a local bait and tackle shop. They always know the scoop on what's biting, where and when in the area. Small lakes or ponds that have public access and are probably your best bet to start with. When you get there, walk along the shore. Look for places where the fish might hide or find food. This could include little rock piles, drowned trees, the edges of weed beds, places where the shallow water drops off into deeper water or around docks and piers. Start small, then move to the streams or creeks, then a small lake. Maybe eventually rent a boat to see if you like that. There's nothing like drifting or being anchored and hearing the water slap against the boat while waiting for that big one to come along and snag your line. Again, there are boating licenses and regulations and you must have the proper licenses and permits before you can rent or buy a boat.

If you don't catch anything, don't take it too seriously. There are many reasons the fish aren't biting that day but at least you got out of the house and enjoyed the time with your family. Just remember, if you can't or don't know how to clean(fillet) the fish or intend to eat them.... please... put them back in the water.

WORK LESS ON YOUR GARDEN, IT'S BETTER FOR EVERYONE (EXCEPT YOUR CHIROPRACTOR)

The last 10 years have seen gardens trends move from the fussy and high maintenance Victorian style, to the 'No Mow' natural look. As much as I fully support our pollinators, I also don't expect everyone to rip up their grass, toss the boxwoods and ditch every annual. Instead, let's find a place where both sides can collaborate and move forward while supporting the environment and saving your back muscles.

- 1) Try this to amend soil; just add manure as required & sweep leaves directly into the perennial beds. The leaves act as mulch to keep out weeds, while worms and water percolate the manures' nutrients into the soil. Turning the soil (as many landscape maintenance companies do) is actually detrimental, it disturbs the roots of trees, perennials, and the highly beneficial nematodes, fungi, and insects necessary for optimal earth.
- 2) Try these easy care, drought tolerant, pollinator friendly and tough perennials: Liatris, Coneflower, Columbine, Salvia & Sedum. Easy annuals: Verbena bonariensis, Nicotania, Alyssum, Calendula (Also easy to save the seeds, skip buying, on all of these and sow directly at the end of May)
- 3) The lawn has come under a lot of scrutiny of late but it remains a living, breathing, permeable and cooling surface – unlike concrete or acres of black mulch. Many smaller gardens won't need grass; good design and a choice of interesting groundcovers will eliminate mowing (Actually rescuing you from the tyranny of fixing, storing, buying, gassing and starting a mower)

BUT a lawn is also the homeowner's version of a meadow – it's traditional and goes with a traditional home. Larger properties require a grassy area to keep the place looking cared for and inviting. A lawn does not have to be a monoculture with nary a bloom in sight, allowing small spring bulbs, clover and 'gasp', the occasional weed is OK & actually encouraged. An innovative and dependable alternative, Eco-lawn is drought tolerant, requires less fertilizing and can be mown like regular grass or left un-mown for a free-flowing 'carpet effect'. 

If you intend to stick with your own, regular sod, try 'Grasscycling,' which was featured on CBC radio (search their site for the audio file); it involves mowing a dry lawn to prevent clumps of clippings and only cutting off an inch or so, letting the clippings fall as a more ecological source of nitrogen and a natural mulch to keep out weeds.

And there we have it, don't bag and toss your leaves or mow the grass too much, never mind raking out the beds or turning the soil. Try even one of the tips listed above and count the benefits of your 'lacklabour' rewards towards a more ecological garden.



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WHO DESIGNS OUR CITIES?

Spring weather brings people outside – especially to our waterfront, parks, trails, gardens, soccer pitches and pools. I'm sure you're aware that public space is created, funded (with taxes) and managed by the city. It's part of city planning. And that is led by our civic leaders and implemented by well trained staff and cherished by the people who make use of these resources.

Did you ever stop to think about the process a city goes through to create a park, garden or gathering place for its citizens? How is use determined? And by what criteria is it evaluated. Who will use it? As the space ages, does it still work? As the demographic of a neighbourhood changes does the space evolve too or become redundant? What's there now and how is it being used?

A few weeks ago friends and I viewed Citizen Jane at the Westdale Theatre. This is a documentary about Jane Jacobs, a woman who effected change in her New York City neighbourhood. She and fellow residents were galvanized when a city planned and approved freeway would destroy a public park in their Washington Square neighbourhood. This was a place of recreation and congregation for local families and children. She and the team of residents – wealthy with energy, creativity, enthusiasm and dedication took on NYC politicians and decision makers. The "parkway" was never built.

So if more women could influence city planning, would our cities look (and function) differently? Two of the City of Hamilton's goals are to be "the best place to raise a child" and the recently added "best place to age successfully." Raising kids and getting old are not the exclusive territory of women but it's interesting to learn cities around the globe are using a gender lens to gain insight into creating cities that are safe and functional for all. They're asking new questions.





The Hotel on the Corner of Bitter and Sweet by Jamie Ford is set in Seattle during WW2. A young Chinese-American boy, Henry Lee meets Keiko Okabe at the English language school where, as the only Asian students they are the target of racism and bullying. When the government rounds up all of the Japanese Americans and interns them in camps far inland, Henry and Keiko are separated. It is only many years later, after Henry's wife dies, that Henry and Keiko are reunited with the help of Henry's son. Conflict and love between generations, war and injustice contrasted with the beauty of friendship and music are the 'bitter and sweet' of the title. (Nov. 2012)



The Girls by Lori Lansens opens with the lines "I have never looked into my sister's eyes. I have never bathed alone. I never stood in the grass at night and raised my have arms to the beguiling moon. I've never used an airplane bath-

room. Or worn a hat. Or been kissed like that. I've never driven a car. Or slept through the night. Never a private talk. Or solo walk. I've never climbed a tree. Or faded into a crowd. So

many things I've never done, but oh, how I've been loved." These words are written by Rose, one of the girls in the title, who is joined at the head to her twin sister Rose. (Dec. 2012)

The Birth House by Ami McKay follows the joys and sorrows, trials and triumphs of Dora Rare, the first girl in five generations of Rares. Situated in a remote Nova Scotia community in the early 20th century, the book addresses issues such as domestic abuse, bigotry, the Halifax Explosion and the blinkered attitudes of the medical profession and society in general toward women, women's health and childbirth. Engaging characters and insights into life in the early 20th Century make this book a worthwhile read. (May 2013)

The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society by Mary Ann Shaffer the story is told through letters exchanged between Juliet Ashton, an author in search of her next book and a group of unlikely book lovers in post-war Guernsey. The characters came alive and the plot moved forward so easily that you forgot that you were reading a bunch of letters. The Literary Society was invented on the spot as an alibi for a group of residents of Guernsey to be out after curfew. The group had met clandestinely to feast on a pig that had been hidden from the German occupiers to prevent it from being confiscated. The characters are engaging and quirky. The occupation of the island of Guernsey was to be Hitler's stepping stone to England and you learn much of the privations and indignities, the outright brutality of war and the triumph of human spirit as you read this book. 

CANADA'S MOST PRODUCTIVE INVENTOR

George Johann Klein was relatively unknown in his native Canada until the Canadian Encyclopedia dubbed him as Canada's most productive inventor;. He grew up at 12 Caroline Street in Hamilton with his family. Young George would visit his father George Klien's jewelry store, Klien and Binkley on James St. where he nurtured his natural curiosity of how things where made and worked.

His father's store, very successful both selling jewelry, clocks and watches and repairing watches introduced young George to engineering and micro-engineering, a world of watchmakers. He also developed the artist in himself working with gold and silversmiths who made and repaired the jewelry. George spent hours tinkering or building something in the basement workshop. He built a one metre fully functional sailboat and played with it on Hamilton Bay.

He was also an accomplished violinist in both Hamilton and Ottawa. After graduating from the Hamilton Technical School on Wentworth Street North near Cannon, Klein continued his studies at The University of Toronto where he graduated in 1928 with a Bachelor's Degree in Applied Science. He was invited to join his professor as Director of Mechanical Engineering at the National Research Council, Canada's agency of Research and Development, in Ottawa where he stayed for 40 years.

George was involved in many projects such as designing the NRC's first wind tunnel. George was also an avid cross-country skier and this gave him the idea of developing a plastic coating for skis on airplanes to allow them to take off and land from snow or ice-covered runways. This led him to design and build a small, but agile snowmobile.

During the 50's George designed an antenna roughly 4 meters long and flat that could be unfolded to 40 meters called STEM for NASA. The antenna was first successfully used in 1962 aboard the Canadian satellite Aloutte-1. NASA soon after adopted it for use during the Mercury, Gemini, and the Apollo space programs of the 60's and early 70's.It was used when Apollo 11 landed on the moon.

George Klien then retired from the NRC to Carleton University in Ottawa as a part-time lecturer. However, when NASA launched the Space Shuttle program in the early 70's and realized they needed a robotic arm to transfer the heavy payloads from the cargo bay into its intended positions. Today, we know it as the Canadarm.

George Klien passed away November 4,1992 at 88 years of age after a short illness in Ottawa. In his Honor Carleton University in Ottawa established the George Klein Medal for high school students participating in an industrial design competition.


