WHERE FAITH **BUILDS COMMUNITY**" ST. LAWRENCE CHURCH AND THE NORTH END

As reported in the last issue of The Breezes, a town hall meeting was held at St. Lawrence in February to discuss its future in light of the Catholic Diocese of Hamilton's study of the viability of some smaller downtown parishes. The high attendance and intense discussion that took place at that event highlights the deep connections of St. Lawrence with its parishioners as well as the North End as a whole.

The beautiful red brick church building with its bell tower and memorial garden is a North End landmark and its social and outreach activities play not only a central role in the lives of its members but in the continuing vitality of the neighbourhood. Many of its parishioners are from families who have been here since the beginnings of the North End in the mid 19th century. Who better to present their community history than the parishioners themselves? Here it is in their own words:

"St. Lawrence church was built in 1890 under the direction of Bishop Dowling on the site called Bayside Hill, also known as St. Lawrence Ward, at the cost of less than \$2000. It was built in less than eight months. The official opening of the church was held

on November 23 at 10am. It was the third Catholic church in the city of Hamilton and the only one built with a hall for community involvement.

"The hall has provided a place for the community to get together, with amenities such as a gym, bowling alley and a stage for plays and concerts. It is also used for parish dinners, dances, bingo, turkey rolls, the Nib-

ble and Bids auction and penny sales. The parish has also been involved in the St. Vincent de Paul Society, Holy Name Society Men's Club, Catholic Women's League (CWL), Catholic Youth Organization (CYO), bowling leagues and, from 1944 till 1999, a credit union to help parishioners. The hall was used by the Bennetto School students after the school fire in 1965, until a new school was built. The hall was used each Wednesday from November to March for the Out of the Cold program. The bingo was moved to a bigger location in 1974 and is still active today in maintaining the church.

"The Turkey Roll, as we know it today, started in 1964 and has been an annual event in our community ever since. With the help of parish committee and volunteers, it has brought new and old parish-



ioners and North Enders together. The parish has always maintained a working relationship with our own Catholic Separate School in preparation of the Sacraments such as First Communion, Confirmation, and religious programs. St. Lawrence's also has an excellent literacy program for the children in the parish every week.

"Over the years donations from our faithful parishioners and other donors have helped greatly to cover parish needs and maintenance. We hope, with help from our parish priest, committees and parish organizations to keep the parish alive for many years to come!!!"

It's clear that St. Lawrence parish's charitable and social activities play a vital role in our neighbourhood. Let's give it our continuing support.







READ A ROAD MAP DAY

On Read a Road Map Day, April 5th we can give thanks to that old folded up road map in your glove box or under the car seat for helping us when we were lost or planning that great family vacation. There was a time before the GPS (Global Positioning System) apps and gadgets we could travel across Canada drive up to a gas pump get gas, have our windshield cleaned and the person pumping gas would ask if we'd like our fluids checked. It was also a time when the gas companies would hand out free roadmaps of the area just for the asking. People would cherish these road maps long after their trips to remember some of the places they've driven through or visited while on a vacation or a road trip.

The Turin Papyrus Map is sometimes characterized as the earliest known road map. Drawn around 1160 BC, it depicted routes along dry river beds through a mining region east of Thebes in Ancient Egypt an area known for the Luxor and Karnak Temples that still stand today.

The Manitoba Automobile Association was the first

Automobile Club in Canada. It evolved from the Winnipeg Auto Club and since 1993 has been part of the Canadian Automobile Association. The MAA developed the first Canadian road map in 1904. Maps were hard to use in both Canada and the U.S at the time because there were no numbers or names on either the road or the maps. Early maps would show the road and pictures of landmarks along the route. This didn't work out too well; Landmarks as you know tend to shonge or disappear over time. The outs alubs

change or disappear over time. The auto clubs on both sides of the border pressured governments to not only name or number these roads, they also pushed to add those road names and number on signs along the routes.

The first 'official' Ontario roadmap is credited to the Ontario Ministry of Transportation in 1923. Late in the 1920's the America Automobile Assoc. (AAA) issued the first colored maps to show the best roads and it was a time when American roads were being upgraded to concrete or paved roads and early maps indicate this.

In the 30's the AAA would send out Pathfinders to compare the routes and seek out construction areas and better routes for people to travel on and reflect these things on their road maps.

During the 1940's road map printing came to a standstill due to the war years of W.W-II. Tourism all but ended because of the gasoline rations at the time.

From the 1950's into the 60's travel boomed and so did making road maps. Maps began to show a new form of highways called interstates and major highways in Canada the new Trans-Canada Highway opened in 1962 and wasn't fully completed until 1971. Did you know that it was the lengthiest uninterrupted highway in the world at that time? Also parks, military bases and more were being featured on roadmaps. The AAA also issued special maps for special events such as the World's Fair and the Olympics games.

In the 80's a pattern of spring and fall road construction began and it became too costly for oil companies to keep up and show these changes on their maps. Slowly one after another the days of the free road map came to an end.

Rand-McNally and many Automobile Clubs around the world now produce road maps that were onetime free. Folding maps and books are still available in gas stations, grocery stores, convenience stores and bookstores. The internet is also a valuable source of road maps. Today, many of those old road maps are collector items. There's even a website to the Road Map Collectors Association http://www.roadmap.org.

Some- how reading a road map online just isn't as much fun as trying to re-fold those old maps.

KARIE MEDICATION REMINDER DEVICE

May I tell you about a wonderful product called Karie, developed in Guelph Ontario. Karie is an automated medication management system for use at home. Pills are pre-loaded at the pharmacy (just like the bubblepacks) and the pouch is inserted into the dispenser. Dispenser is plugged into the wall...the device 'reads' the pouches and when it is time to take your medication, it reminds you by sounding a chime and lighting up. It can be programmed to notifiy (via text/email) a caregiver or family member if you don't take your medication.

Developed by AceAge Inc. in Guelph, the company sees many applications for use, but most especially for Seniors living at home who need a reminder to take their meds-and provide peace of mind to a family member by contacting them if the meds are not taken. What a wonderful idea-we will be seeing this in smart homes everywhere-genius!

THE SUNSET **CULTURAL GARDEN -**A PLACE FOR **RESTORING WONDER**

There is a place. Built by volunteers. Visited by winged creatures that need wild spaces. A circle to bring us together. Poetry to feed the soul and flowers to feed our pollinators Celebrations of dance. Children laughing. Benches to rest upon. Pathways home. Sunsets to remember.

The Sunset Cultural Garden was created nearly 4 years ago by local residents, on empty land leased from the City, for use as a community garden space. Traditionally that meant growing vegetables, but garden and community can have numerous meanings. Due to a lack of water on site and a need to maintain large beds with a small labour force, designing a meadow habitat for native plants, native pollinators as well as a fully accessible public space for people to enjoy masses of wild flowers, was the best possible solution.

Through the passion and persistence of a small group of volunteers, some very kind financial donors, (including a grant through the Chinese community via participatory budgeting 2013) what was a flat patch of scruffy grass at the top of a hill has turned into a unique oasis.

The idea of placing poetry in the garden was championed by Rae Pemberton who was inspired by the 76 different languages spoken at nearby Sir John A. Macdonald Secondary School. The poetry plaques each composed to include sunset references, and are written in 14 languages. As for plants; Spring bulbs you might see soon include Scilla, Crocus, Pushkinia, Daffodils and Tulips, & later we can look forward to blue Camassia, Alliums and the huge orange Fritillaria or 'Skunk lily'.

After and amidst the spring bulbs will be an impressive array of over 2000 native perennials.

A full list of plants as well as the history of the gardens' creation, people and groups involved would be lovely on some signage or a plaque someday.

This garden exists despite numerous challenges, some financial and others due to City guidelines. For example, no additional trees were allowed to be planted, no concrete to hold posts for shade structures, and no ornamental fencing or paved walkways were permitted. As a group, we brainstormed creative workarounds to move beyond limitations and built a restorative little oasis with benches, permeable pathways, poetry and big bountiful flowers and grasses.

My hope is that more people will recognize how very privileged we are to have this little oasis and how special

The land it sits upon will be developed in some way, at some time, we don't yet know, and the entire garden will be (literally) up in the air and relocated across the street. We'd love to keep community engaged so this year we hope to bring an outdoor art installation to the gardens, we just had the Easter egg hunt, there will be a Jane's walk and maybe a picnic or other gathering later this year. RECENT SOCIAL JUSTICE INITIATIVES

The Hamilton Community Legal Clinic (HCLC) continues to be active on social justice initiatives in Hamilton and across the country. Two recent efforts stand out.

Celebration of African Canadian Heritage

In February a celebration of African Canadian heritage took place at the Hamilton Central Library.

The event was billed as Know Your Rights: Access to Justice for the African-Canadian Community Connaissez - Vos droits: L'accès à la justice pour la communauté Afro-Canadienne.

The bilingual event focussed on Access to Justice for the Black Community and dealt with education law, housing law, human rights, criminal law & police complaints, child protection and mental health law.

Panel members spoke to these topics and worked in conversation circles with the more than one hundred participants who attended.

Call for Inquiry

Several years ago the Hamilton Community Legal Clinic embarked on a collaborative journey with Aboriginal agencies and networks.

The program that was developed, called YÉN:TENE, works to improve access to justice for Indigenous people in Hamilton and surrounding communities.

In that context, we felt compelled to address the death of Colten Boushie and the Justice's system response to

In 2016, twenty-two old Boushie died in Saskatchewan after being shot by Gerald Stanley. Stanley, charged with second-degree murder was acquitted on February

Along with other Indigenous Justice Coordinators (IJC's) in Southwest Ontario, we have written to Jody Wilson-Raybould, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada. We have asked for an inquiry into Colten Boushie's death. We want the treatment of Boushie's family that occurred during the investigation process looked into as well.

We have called for funding of Indigenous law institutes. These institutes would promote the development, use, and understanding of Indigenous laws and access to justice in accordance with the unique. That call is spelled out in the Truth and Reconciliation Commissions' Call to Action #50.


"Indigenous people in Canada should never feel we are part of a disposable population. We should never feel unsafe or targeted on our own land. The Gerald Stanley verdict has contributed to the escalating feeling of hopelessness and vulnerability that we feel in this country. There is hopelessness and vulnerability in a legal system that has proven over and over again to not work for us, notes Lyndon George, IJC with YÉN:TENE of the HCLC.

The IJC's are seeking endorsements from other organizations.

At our March meeting we discussed Gutenberg's Apprentice by Alix Christie.

This novel describes the development of the printing press, an invention that changed the known world rapidly. We follow the events through the eyes of Peter, a trained scribe who is co-opted by his foster fa-

ther, Johann Fust to apprentice to Johannes Gutenberg in order to keep an eye on Fust's investment in the project. The writing is detailed but not boring, immersing us in the smells, sounds and labour in the workshop and the political intrigue and events that swirled around Europe at that time. Some members found the book a bit too long; others thoroughly enjoyed it.

The Song of Batoche by Maia Caron. Caron was inspired to write a story of the 1885 Northwest Rebellion. Riel returns from his exile in Montana to lead the Métis in the fight for their lands. An interesting perspective on Riel, Dumont and the politics of Canada and the role of Sir John A. MacDonald, the roman Catholic Church and the Hudson's Bay Company. Engaging and informative. (Kit)

Mothers and Other Strangers by Gina Sorell. The opening sentence of this novel grabs you immediately. "My father proposed to my mother at gunpoint when she was nineteen, and knowing that she was pregnant with a dead man's child, she accepted." In some ways, this line may be the best part of the book. Elsie returns home upon her mother's death and becomes embroiled in a mystery. Who was her mother? Why was she so attached to a new-age cult? What event caused her to move precipitously from South Africa to Canada with her young daughter? Eventually Elsie unravels the mystery to the reader's satisfaction. Engaging if not great fiction. 

Jane Jacobs (1916-2006) In her book The Death and Life of Great American Cities she wrote, "Cities have the capability of providing something for everybody, only because, and only when, they are created everybody."



You know spring has officially arrived when you start to see and hear news about the annual Jane's Walk Festival. Jane's Walk is a series of free, citizen-led walking conversations inspired by urbanist and activist Jane Jacobs. Hamilton has been participating since 2013.

The "Walk" honours Jane's ideas and legacy. Although she was not a formally educated planner, Jane had great visions for city design. And her body of work has had a profound influence on planners, architects, politicians, and activists alike.

Jane Jacobs thought of cities as adaptable ecosystems that thrive when communities are designed so that home, work, and play are all within reach. She believed local residents should have a voice in how their cities develop, and encouraged citizens to get to know more about the dynamics of their neighbourhoods. In her 1957 essay "Downtown is for People" she wrote, "No [planner] can find what will work for our cities by looking at ... suburban garden cities, manipulating scale models, or inventing dream cities. You've got to get out and walk."

Jane's Walks are intended to get people walking and talking in our neighbourhoods. They invite us to come out and see for ourselves what makes our city great. Walks are organized and led by everyday Hamiltonians who want to share what they know about special places in the city and typically last from one to two hours. Walks are an opportunity to meet our neighbours, make new friends, learn something new or share our knowledge. We can join a walk in a neighbourhood that we know or choose a walk somewhere we've never explored. To date, hundreds of participants have enjoyed walks throughout the lower city, on the mountain, and in Stoney Creek, Dundas and Ancaster.

Jane's Walks give us an opportunity to have meaningful conversations about the past, present and future of our neighbourhoods - from the architectural aspects to the psychosocial and environmental impacts that affect our everyday lives. The walks also provide us with a platform to make our voices heard inside City Hall. Staying informed and connected on a local level was important to Jane Jacobs.





STRUGGLING WITH THE TERRIBLE TWOS, **TERRIBLE THREES OR TERRIBLE FOURS?**

A Harbour West Neighbours Report

April 2018

Pier 8 and the OMB

Harbour West Neighbours has appealed the zoning by-law and subdivision plan enacted by City Council to control the future development on Pier 8. The OMB has held two pre-hearing conferences and has approved the six issues to go to a hearing. At the heart of the HWN appeal is the problem created by the fact that the City, as the owner of Pier 8, is the developer. It also has the power the power to make the rules. It is like the referee at a Tiger Cat game playing for one of the teams. (Two local industries, P+H and Bunge, have also appealed.)

The six issues approved for a hearing can be summarized as follows:

- Are the City traffic and parking studies sufficient to forecast future traffic and parking on the adjacent neighbourhood?
- Does the City zoning for Pier 8 strengthen and enhance the North End Neighbourood as required by the Official Plan (Setting Sail)?
- Was the public participation carried on by the City adequate and did it provide an effective contribution to the planning process?
- Do the Zoning By-Law and Subdivision comply with the Official Plan (Setting Sail) requirements for an urban design study of Piers 7 & 8?
- Has the North End Traffic Management Plan been fully implemented before development as required by Setting Sail?
- Do the zoning and subdivision by-laws approve a density and character of development for Pier 8 that conforms to the policies of Setting Sail?

The heart of the HWN appeal is that the City has unlawfully moved from the approved number of units (750) and now proposes to build 1500 or more units, increasing traffic and parking demands and preventing Pier 8 development from providing affordable family housing that integrates with the existing homes in the North End neighbourhood. The appeal also will deal with the substantially increased size of commercial and retail uses that also will bring increased traffic and parking. As a child and family friendly neighbourhood, traffic and parking area major issues.
